



CONSERVATION AND PROTECTION OF THE MAYA TEXTILE ART OF INDIGENOUS WOMEN

OF GUATEMALA



«Empowering women is the most effective development tool.» - Kofi Annan

What does it mean to empower women?

Each has their own definition of women's empowerment, a multidimensional concept that involves education, training, psychology, economics and more. For us at the Foundation, empowering women is about supporting them and giving them access to training and tools.

The ultimate goal is to provide women with ways to earn a decent living and improve their quality of life and that of their children, as well as to give them a greater ability to make decisions about their future, be heard and have an impact in their society and in the lives of other women like them.

One good example of this is a project for the empowerment of marginalized and vulnerable indigenous women carried out in 2019 in partnership with Horizons of Friendship and AFEDES (Asociación Femenina para el Desarrollo de Sacatepéquez). We supported technical training for the women to help them improve their weaving skills and build their self-confidence and self-esteem.

As part of this project, 151 Kaqchikel and K'iche' women and girls in Guatemala received training in ancestral weaving techniques needed to produce traditional Mayan textiles. In addition to the technical skills they learned to increase their family's income, the traditional aspect of weaving serves to conserve and protect of Maya cultural heritage, which is an integral part of the identity of these women.

Each one of these women has her own story. Here's a testimonial from Manuela Chicop Puac, who tells us what this project means for her.





I'm married and I have a baby. I studied up until grade 7. I was interested in weaving because I learned how to weave when I was 7. I stopped because my mother died, and I was very sad. I also had to find a job. Later, I got married and I had my son. I still wanted to learn how to weave, but I couldn't because my baby was still too young. I learned that AFEDES helped women who wanted to learn how to weave, but unfortunately, I couldn't participate because I was always busy with my chores. One day, one of the instructors told me that children didn't have to get in the way of achieving my goals. Then, I decided to participate in the workshops. Weaving is wonderful work, and all it requires is my own motivation. My husband helps me so I can go to classes. This is a strong motivating factor and also reminds me of my mother. I hope that one day I'll be able to learn how to make other textiles, like clothing.

PURCHASING A RICE MILL FOR RICE FAMERS IN CAPRICE

IN CAPRICE, HAITI

"Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day. Teach a man to fish, and you feed him for a lifetime." This proverb perfectly illustrates how much agriculture projects can improve food conditions for communities in developing countries and make a lasting impression for future generations. Aside from completing a project, what matters the most to us at the Foundation is how it impacts the lives of the poorest people in the world. Their progress is our greatest source of pride, and here is an example of this.

The rural community of Lapierre in the Carice commune is in an isolated and mountainous region in Haiti's Nord-Est department. Rice is the country's most important crop (70%). Most residents of Lapierre are farmers, and both men and women cultivate rice in a traditional fashion. Before receiving a rice mill through this project, rice grains were husked by hand using a mortar and pestle, or women had to walk nearly 6 km to then nearest mill, which was not always available or operational.

Purchasing an electric rice mill allows the community to have a processing unit nearby. For a small price, women can mill their rice, which reduces processing time, travel costs and delays in the product's sale, commerce being their only way to earn a living with their work.

To ensure the smooth operation and longevity of the rice mill, a shed was built to house it and a committee was constituted to ensure the management of the equipment: 40% of revenue earned from the mill's use will go towards its maintenance.

In addition to improving the work conditions of rice farmers, this project generates income by directly hiring maintenance technicians and indirectly hiring many saleswomen who can now process the rice quickly to sell it in local markets. This also allows women to free up their time and to spend it in training or with their families.

DRINKING WATER

Access to drinking water: more than 2 billion people still do not have this basic right (UN)

Access to drinking water will remain one of the Foundation's priorities as long as two billion people in developing countries must travel long distances to get to a source of water, which is all too often unsanitary.

Being able to access safe a plentiful supply of drinking water at a close distance has a direct impact on a population's health. It also saves time that could be invested in educating young people or earning a good

Drinking water is vital, and so is water for food!

Notatinga is a village situated in Burkina Faso's arid lands. The population mostly consists of farmers who have come together to form the Association Buud Nooma.

Farmers received technical training in sustainable farming and food processing from the Clercs de St-Viateur of Banfora in order to improve the food conditions of their community. These people can know share what they have learned with other farmers in the association. However, they still had a critical need for water.

To reverse the desertification of the area, maintain existing orchards and community gardens, and diversify production, a 40-metre well was drilled and a solar-powered pump was installed. A water management committee was also formed and all villagers have participated in workshops on sanitation. A 5000-litre water tower was also built for domestic use. This equipment can irrigate up to 10 hectares of farmland, thus ensuring the food security of 3,000 residents.

Water used to irrigate parcels of land will help to ensure the farmers' yield and the sale of fresh produce and other products processed by women, which will significantly increase the revenues of many families in the village.

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
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
